For a few months I was in the field with Co. B. We lost Alan Grotske at Hill 162. "We think of Alan every day", his sister said. They don't need Memorial Day in the Grotske family. At Arlington National Cemetery are 260,000 graves. But how can we count the number of the bereaved? So, we must remember the bereaved."

DRIVE ON!

“You Can’t Be Serious . . .”

That phrase kind of sums up the first reaction that I usually receive when I ask a Viet Nam vet if he’s considered going back over to the country where he fought forty years ago. Either by spoken word or look in his eye, he’s asking me if I’m really serious. Quickly following “the look” is usually the question “Why would I ever want to go back there?” Why indeed?

Those of us who survived our service with Bravo Company back then returned home in different ways and as different people. Some of us came home on a “Freedom Bird” after serving a full, twelve-month tour. Others came home on a medical evacuation flight, suffering from physical injuries and wounds received during the conflict. Some of our wounds were crippling and debilitating; others were less serious and healed quickly. Some of us had no physical wounds at all, but soon found that the horror of what we had seen and done in battle had left us with some emotional issues—post traumatic stress disorder, or “PTSD”. Most of us with less serious emotional scars were able to get about the business of building new careers and starting families. But none of us came home quite the same—we all were changed in some way.

Fast forward to the year 2011. Most of us are now sixty-something. Our post-military careers are either over or fast winding down. We’ve got more time to spend with family and friends, and more time to do some traveling. In the last ten years or so, we’ve discovered the fabulous B-2/501 website that Cathy Jimerson developed and maintains for us, and we’ve linked up with one or more Bravo “buddies” that we once thought we’d never see again. Chances are we’ve even gone to a B-2/501 reunion like the one coming up this year in Branson MO, and spent priceless time with one another remembering moments, days, and experiences forty years ago. Great stuff!

John Marks, Bob Layton, Al Werth, Steve Forsstrom, and I certainly had done all of those things, and all of us were looking forward to the Branson reunion to continue the great times. Then along came a B-2/501 newsletter in September 2009 with a picture taken a few months earlier of B-2/501 alums Dan Albrecht and John Ward climbing Hamburger Hill in Viet Nam! “You can’t be serious! Viet Nam? Hamburger Hill?” And just that quickly, we started asking each other “Do you want to go back to Viet Nam?”, “How much will it cost?”, “Who can help us with visas and arrangements?”, “When can we go?”, “Where can we go?”, etc., etc.

Long story cut short, all of us except Al Werth (who had an unexpected business conflict) did go back to Viet Nam in April 2010 with Team XXV from “VVRP” (Veterans Viet Nam Restoration Project, <http://www.vvrp.org/>). This is the same organization with which Dan Albrecht and John Ward had gone back in 2009. Our stories are told on their website for Teams XXIV and XXV with lots of pictures.

But this story isn’t so much about the logistics of returning as it is about the reason for returning. The four of us who went back in 2010 had served together in 1969-70. John and I were in 1st Platoon “humping the boonies” together for four months, and Bob Layton followed me as 1st Plt Ldr shortly after Steve Forsstrom took over as 2nd Plt Ldr. Even in our small group of four, some of us came home forty years ago with PTSD issues of varying degrees and others of us came home thinking that we didn’t have much emotional baggage at all. The experience of going back to Viet Nam brought us together “24 by 7” in late March and most of April 2010. Even though Team XXV had eight other members besides the four of us, the “gang of four” was constantly together, and the conversations almost invariably returned to things that happened in 1969-1970: “Do you remember when . . . ?”, “Where were you when . . . ?”, “Did you see . . . ?”, “What happened on . . . ?”, “Who was it that . . . ?”, etc., etc.

As we talked and picked each other’s memories fogged by forty years of time, we realized that something good was happening. We could talk about things with each other that we couldn’t talk about with anyone else in this world. We could vent frustrations, and anger, and

sorrow with one another because we had lived those times together forty years ago. We could feel at peace not having to explain ourselves to one another, because we were talking with guys who had walked the same trails, and no explanation was necessary. Sometimes after long conversations, we could almost feel emotional “garbage” leaving our minds that we never even knew was there. Amazing!

So, back to the question “Why would I ever want to go back to Viet Nam?”--there are lots of reasons, and here are a few: If you return, you will see what most people agree is a beautiful country, but, this time, in a time of peace. You can witness the remarkable recovery from war made by some of the most incredibly energetic people you will ever witness. You can visit places where you served many years ago, and see how those places look today. You can visit famous battle sites and beautiful resorts. You can accomplish all of these things and more, with almost any Viet Nam travel package.

But, if you go back with a group like VVRP, you can do all of those things, and so much more. You can go back with a small group of vets and work for a couple of weeks on a humanitarian project (such as building a kindergarten), and feel like you’ve made a contribution to Viet Nam’s recovery. You can share wartime experiences with vets (ours *and* theirs) that you’ve never met before, and achieve a greater degree of closure. You can be welcomed back and thanked by officials of a government that you once considered your enemy. You can even put together your own “gang” of two or more B-2/501 buddies and enrich the experience beyond description.

But the most important reason for going back to Viet Nam is that when you come home this time, just like forty years ago, you won’t be quite the same. You’ll be changed again, but this time in a most positive way. Today, there are twelve spaces available on VVRP Team XXVII going to Viet Nam in April 2012.
